## ***Forward***

Cricket portrays the activities of thousands of club cricketers who play the game because of the immense recreational enjoyment that it gives them. The majority will never reach a higher pedestal in the cricketing world than that they have already achieved; but by their enthusiasm, unrelenting work and example they are inspiring in the youth of the present generation that love the game of cricket.

Cricket is not a game; it's a way of life. Detractors mistake the shadow for the substance, it thrives not because of those who stand and watch, but because of the myriad men and women in all lands who played the game. Cricket is a symbol of democracy as is no other game.

The game is quietly conservative, but there are times when emotions are stirred. It is the game of the masses; its origin was among the shepherd boys on the fields of Kent and Sussex. Since then, it has not only spread to every country of the British Commonwealth, but is embraced by many in many lands.

But wherever played, it is contested with that same dignity and respect for authority. The umpire is the symbol of authority, he rules by word of mouth, he needs no power of force. That is cricket, that is civilised democracy. The game has bred its champions; Grace, Trumper, Bradman, but the little men keep cricket on its mighty pedestal.

Cricket portrays the life of the club cricket – the little men of cricket. He is the man who lives for his game on the Saturday afternoon, it is he who inhabits thousands of parks throughout our sun swept land. It is in his ranks that champions shine with a lustre that illumines them for the future.

The little man goes placidly on his way, the champions come and go like ships in the night. The game of cricket goes on because that it is the character of cricket, it is a placid undisturbed game. Occasionally there is a ripple on the surface, but soon the undisturbed returns.

Cricket is an English game, it reflects the English character – that unhurried, undemonstrative approach to life. That is why the game is such a valuable recreation, approached to life, that is why the little man gains so much joy. The game rose to its greatest heights in the years following the war, men sought the game as soon as the mad whirring of war ceased.

The game was at peace, cricket was significant with the life men wished to live – placid, democratic, undisturbed. As the game reached its pinnacle in the post war years, the powers failed to stabilise the conquest, they let the game cascade into its present gloom.

A more dynamic and imaginative attitude is essential to regain lost ground, the junior ranks, the schools and country districts are valuable nurseries that needs to be seeded. They are the wealth of talent, and with imaginative administration and encouragement would see the growth return.

The other area of growth is the female domain, the past few years has seen women young and old, start participating in the game of cricket. With more women playing the game brings more areas of where they can grow, televised games opened the domain of other nations to participate.

This book is about the little men, and women who have participated and helped with running of the Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association from its beginning to where it is now. There are some great stories about some of the characters who played, there are too many to be written. There are all the Premiers and Major Premiers, Trophies presented to every grade through-out its history and clubs and teams who have participated from 1921/22 season.

The Association has seen some famous cricketers, who gave their time to speak at the Associations Smoke Socials and Presentations. Young and old came many a mile to meet and hear these cricketers pass on their life

of playing cricket. There have been many ripples throughout the years even within the past few seasons, but cricket continues to survive.

## **Some articles from the Newcastle Herald and The Newcastle Sun**

### **Newcastle Sun 11<sup>th</sup> August 1921**

#### **New Association Formed**

The cricket season promises to be a very busy one, as in addition to the Newcastle District Cricket Association, the newly formed City and Suburban Cricket Association will conduct a competitive programme in the Three Grades.

The association, which was launched at a meeting held in the Y.M.C.A, "Hut" on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> August 1921, will enable teams outside the district scheme to continue in competitive cricket in a suitable grade.

The meeting was attended by representatives of 19 clubs, and intimation was received of the intention of several other clubs to join the association. The necessary steps for the formation of the association having been decided upon, the meeting was adjourned until next Wednesday night in the "Hut," when details of organization and election of officers will be arranged.

Clubs desiring to play in the association are requested to send accredited delegates to this meeting.

### **Newcastle Herald 12<sup>th</sup> August 1921**

A meeting was held in the Y.M.C.A." Hut" on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> August, to consider the visibility of forming a City and Suburban Cricket Association. Nineteen teams and three former associations were represented, intimation also being received from several clubs not represented of their readiness to assist. The meeting decided to carry out the object of the meeting, and adjourned until next Wednesday, when details as to organization, grounds, and officers will be determined upon.

The meeting laid down that one of the newly-formed association should be to constitute a recruiting ground for district cricket. Such an association will also enable old-established clubs, which under the district scheme would have disbanded, to preserve their entity

### **Newcastle Sun 17<sup>th</sup> August 1921**

The adjourned meeting of the City and Suburban Cricket Association was held in "The Hut". Over 40 representatives of various clubs attended. The meeting was most enthusiastic Mr. J. L. Cowie was voted to the chair; various officers were appointed. The names will be made public on receipt of their agreement to act in the capacities desired.

Twenty clubs advised of their intention of joining the Association, twelve were unable to definitely advise owing to the fact that their annual meetings had not been held. The advices received indicated the strong probability of these clubs linking up.

An executive committee was appointed to draft a constitution and rules, and to make arrangements in regards to grounds. The chairman reported that Alderman H. P. Cornish had promised to donate a handsome silver shield to be competed for in A Grade (still in use 100 years later).

General satisfaction was expressed by members of the meeting, on the action of the conveners in promoting the movement for a new Association. It was stated by a number of old-time players, that

this meeting was one of the most representative cricket association meetings that ever been held in the district.

#### **Newcastle Herald 21<sup>st</sup> September 1921**

Final arrangements in connections with the City and Suburban Cricket Association programme for the ensuing season will be made at the next meeting of club representatives, to be held in "The Hut," Perkin-street, this evening. Twenty-Four clubs constitute the strength of the association, and two concrete wickets are being laid in addition to those in possession of individual clubs. Competition in all three grades to be exceptionally keen.

#### **Newcastle Sun 28<sup>th</sup> September 1921**

At a recent meeting of the committee of the City and Suburban Cricket Association, the draw for the first game of the Association was made.

Several outstanding items of business were dealt with, and the executive committee membership was brought up to its full quota.

The Secretary, Mr. Opie, reported that the printing of constitution and match programmes was in hand, and copies would be available to the clubs before the start of the season. The opening matches of the Association would be on the 1<sup>st</sup> October and the 8<sup>th</sup> October 1921.

#### **Newcastle Herald 29<sup>th</sup> September 1921**

The committee of the City and Suburban Cricket Association has found it necessary to make some alteration in the arrangements for its first series of matches, owing to certain wickets not being available yet. The programme for the first game of the Association will be held on the 1<sup>st</sup> October and the 8<sup>th</sup> October 1921.

#### **Newcastle Sun 20<sup>th</sup> January 1922**

##### **Cornish Trophy**

This beautiful trophy, the gift of Mr. H. P. Cornish, will be on view in a few weeks. The trophy, which is Mr. Cornish's own design, is both unique and appropriate. It takes the form of a silver cricket bat, supported on an ebony stand, around the edges of which are placed reproductions of eight silver cricket balls. The donor's name will appear on the handle, and the name of the Association on the blade.

In this, its inaugural season, the Association has secured the donation of two cups and one trophy, and part from such offers, are donating three sets of medals, comprising 12 in each, which in the history of Newcastle cricket, has never been before attempted by so young an Association from its infancy.

The donors are to be highly complimented for their splendid encouragement of the grand old game.

## ***100 Years of City and Suburban Cricket Association***

The Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association was formed in August 1921. The Association gained the honour and prestige not only in Australia but throughout the world. But the 100 years have not been all happiness. Many men and women have put in countless hours of work and energy into the making the Association what it is today.

From a not-so-humble beginning, the Association has gradually built up its forces; it was the City and Suburban Cricket Association that fostered the game in Newcastle and survived through periods of depression, floods, droughts and a World War. In that time, it has grown to accommodate more than 200 senior and junior teams, its teams and players will long be remembered in the annuals of Australian cricket. Its junior competition was regarded highly throughout Australia, and representative teams have the honors and distinctions to substantiate the praise.

A contributing fact to the success of the City and Suburban Association has been the leadership of senior officers. In the 100 Year period, the City and Suburban Association has had only 11 Secretaries and 10 Presidents.

Formed at a meeting in the YMCA in 1921, the City and Suburban Association had one main aim – to provide a cricket competition for the many young and older men who were deprived of regular matches because of shift work. With Newcastle being an industrial town, most men worked shift work at the coal mines or industries. The Newcastle District Association premiership matches were played over two Saturdays and many men could not play because they would be forced to miss one Saturday because of working commitments.

Clergymen of different denominations played a leading role in the foundation of Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association. At the initial meeting, there were five Priests and Ministers present, Mr. William Scott was elected President and 5 clerics helped form the committee. The Association decided to play one-day matches and allow teams from any area or group to enter. This was of great benefit to many players who were forced in the District Competition to play with a team from their own area. The City & Suburban supplied a competition where a group of friends, work mates and family could play together even though they came from different areas.

Those areas took into Four local government precepts, Newcastle, Port Stephens, Lake Macquarie and the Central Coast. Some suburbs supplied multiple teams that are not linked Constitutionally or financially, which was not compatible with the location-based arrangements of the district competition.

Since the start in 1921 the Association has gone from strength to strength. The first competition in the summer of 1921-22 was drawn up from 21 teams in three grades, `A`, `B`, & `C`. The 21 clubs were BHP, Fire Brigade, YMCA, Adamstown Methodist, Dora Creek, Boolaroo, Wallarah, St James (West Wallsend), Central Methodists Mission, HACBS, Hamilton Loco, Tighes Hill, Adamstown Swifts, Carrington, Stockton, St Pauls, Port Waratah, Seahampton High School, Hamilton Methodists and Cooks Hill High School. Fire Brigade won the `A` Grade Minor Premiership from Hamilton Loco and took out the Final. `B` Grade was won by Adamstown Methodists and `C` Grade by Port Waratah, who were beaten in the final by Adamstown Swifts.



Formed shortly after the City and Suburban Cricket Association, the City and Suburban Umpires Association formed in 1923. Its objects were to co-operate with the N.C.S.C. Association for the promotion of cricket in Newcastle, by promoting efficiency among Umpires, and to assist the Association by enforcing the laws and rules of cricket.

Before any member is admitted to the Association, he undergoes an examination to ensure he possesses sufficient knowledge of the laws of cricket, and that he is fit to act as an umpire. Umpires are allotted to games by a selection committee formed by the Umpires Association, failure to act at a match for he was selected for, without giving 24 hours' notice, he is not appointed to any fixtures till a satisfactory explanation has been furnished. The Association has 2 standing committees, its executive and examining, while special committees may be appointed from time to time to examine specific matters.

In the 1935 season, the Association added an 'A' Reserve Competition which was suspended from 1940 to 1943. The Association added 'D' Grade in 1943 and grades were broken up into divisions because of the influx of teams. By 1959-60 more grades were added to A Reserve, B Grade, C Grade and D Grade. With so many teams entering the Association in 1985-86 season the competition went from A Grade all the way to F Grade, a total of 37 Grades.

This is due to the Association being an affordable cricket competition for most of the Greater Newcastle community, and includes teams who receive support from Hotels, Licensed Clubs and Community groups. Some teams have formed from shared interests, backgrounds, school friends, work colleagues and from other Countries, which represents the diversity of the local community both socially and economically.

With all these grades, the Association provides a cricket competition that is available to all players regardless of their ability from the more competitive focus of the higher grades to the more social lower grades, where cricketers of all ages can enjoy their sport. The variety of grades allows for more players to participate at a level where they are comfortable, and with a limit on overs per bowler allows more people to be involved in the game.

One of the most colourful characters in the City and Suburban Cricket was Clarrie 'Firpo' Walters. He played for every District team and a few City and Suburban Clubs, representing Newcastle against the Englishmen twice. He served on the C & S Executive as Vice-President and Assistant-Secretary.

Throughout the years many players famous in other spheres of sport have played in the C&S Competition. These include the rugby league greats Ron Baily and Col Maxwell who both captained Australian Rugby League sides. Ron played for Hamilton Central while Col played for Morison and Bearby.

Probably one of the top sporting teams was Stockton Rovers, the Club was formed from the Stockton Rovers Hockey side and first entered the competition in 1943. Included in the side were six NSW representatives, R Clarke, W Murray, G Dyball, W Twaddell, R Taylor and D Gill.

Throughout its history, the City and Suburban Association has been linked with some of Newcastle's top businessmen and officials. Former Town clerk and Newcastle Jockey Club Secretary, George Wells, was one of the top cricketers when the Association started. Wells played for the Fire Brigade, scored a record 189 against YMCA at District Park on November 18, 1922 and with L Colgan (135) put on 280 runs for the fourth wicket. Fire Brigade finished with a score of 454 runs with 384 runs being scored in 195 minutes.

The highest scoring in an afternoon`s cricket was recorded in 1971 between Adamstown RSL and Merewether Soccer in the `AR3` Competition. Merewether Soccer scored 254 runs for the loss of 3 wickets and Adamstown RSL 243 for 9 wickets in 105 minutes. A total of 497 runs in 225 minutes. On the 1<sup>st</sup> October 1949, Junction and St Peters scored 479 runs in 225 minutes, Junction winning by 1 run 240 to 239.

By the start of the 1948-49 season, Jack Scholes a left-hand bowler from Hume Pipes Work became the first bowler to take 1,000 wickets in the Association. He has taken 998 wickets in club cricket and 21 wickets representing the Association. This amazing feat took 16 ½ seasons, three times he took over 100 wickets and two other occasions 90 wickets fell to him. Jack and George Bush have the remarkable record of taking together 235 wickets in the same season for Hume Pipe Works B Grade side playing in the 1942/43 season.

Playing for Central second grade in the City and Suburban competition on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> November in 1933, J Moy took the whole of Belmont`s wickets, 9, one man being absent. Belmont was dismissed for 27 runs, Moy`s average being 9 for 10, including a hat trick.

There was a 15-year gap before Mr. C Ashton, a Toronto player was the first City and Suburban bowler to secure all 10 wickets in an innings. Ashton a left-hand bowler took 10 for 13 on October 14, 1948.

V Kedwell, playing with the Sulphide Welfare team recorded the best all-round performance in the Association`s records, when he scored 103 runs not-out and then took 9 wickets for 73 runs against South Mayfield in 1948.

In the 1950/51 season, George and Jim Cooper, Maitland Road Baptists, provided the seasons example of brotherly co-operation against Waratah Mayfield. George took all 10 wickets, Jim the wicket-keeper dismissed 5 for him. George, a slow leg break bowler took 10 for 25, including a hat-trick.

District Park, birth place of City and Suburban Cricket, has been leased to the Association by the Newcastle City Council and approved by the minister of lands. District Park is more than a park in the tradition of this Association, it was there that our earliest clubs strove to build grounds, it was there that our earliest matches were played.

Our pioneers saw it raise from a slimy ti-tree swamp, to one of Newcastle`s finest recreation areas. Then we – of this generation, saw it decline towards its original state when council took the lease back to change the way grounds were booked.

Ken Humphries, Honeysuckle Club, compiled 7,232 runs in 298 innings during his 17 seasons in the City and Suburban Cricket, one of the most consistent run-getting machines in the Association.

On January 1985 a long-standing 60-year-old cricket record fell to the opening batsmen of the Action Carpet Cleaners. Warwick Mears and Phil Embleton launched a blistering attack against the Tubemakers bowlers. ACC, defending premiers scored 0-245, Warwick making 133 not out and Phil 101 not out in their 40 overs. This was the highest score recorded in A Grade by a team not losing a wicket. Warwick struck 17 fours and Phil a 6 and 11 fours. Tubemakers put up a spirited run chase which finished at 7-175 after their 40 overs.

From the first season 1921-22, Newcastle City & Suburban Cricket Association has seen over 8,000 clubs register to play cricket in Newcastle and the surrounding Councils. Clubs also made-up multiple teams throughout the years, as more and more men desired to play cricket, this helped to grow over 12,000 teams being registered over the period, clubs changed names when they changed sponsors or when their place of work also had name changes.

During World War 2, clubs and teams desired to have an avenue to play cricket and to take their thoughts away from, the war on Saturday afternoons. The Association continued to have cricket, through the war years, over the 5 years period, 182 teams played. Some teams who participated, came from Fort Scratchley, Navy, RAAF Rathmines, Business, church groups and Industrial sites.

In 1956 the Association was aware of a decline in cricket generally in this district, and in an effort to overcome this position the Association it implemented a Junior Competition with the object of creating an interest for boys who were not receiving any cricket encouragement after leaving school and who were not sufficiently experienced to join the senior ranks. During the first year there were only 10 teams competing in an Under 16 Competition which created very keen interest for the boys, and on each of the following years, the teams increased. The following season the Association held an Under 16 and Under 14 Competition and in 1958 added the Under 12 Premiership, and the Under 10 Competition was introduced in 1964.

From the 1970's the figures continued to staggering proportions which lead to 224 Senior and 248 Junior teams totalling approximately 7,500 registered players, an all-time NCSCA record and as we understood this made our Association the largest in the cricketing world.

In 2007 the Association were contacted by the District Board after it restructured their competition by removing the 5<sup>th</sup> Grade and having only allow 4 grades, due to the increasing cost to run a club. They pleaded their case; with revelations the Board excepted the plea. They hoped this would help bring both Associations closer, as it allowed people to still play cricket, and remain part of their District Club.

The first Patron of the Association in 1921 was Mr. H.P.Cornish who continued until 1929 when the position was taken over by Past President, Mr J.L Cowie. In 1934 Mr. G.W. Jenner was named as Patron of the Association, handing over to Mr R Parry-Okeden in 1936. From 1947 there have been 7 other men holding the position of Patron. The last 2 being Mr Arthur Soper OAM and Mr John Todd.

One of the longest serving officers was Mr. Norwood Wynne-Opie. Initial Secretary of the Association from 1921 until 1924, he took over as President in 1928 until he passed away in January 1951 after a long illness. From 1951 there has only been 7 other Presidents and the longest President was Mr Arthur Soper who held the position from 1981 till 2012.

In the years from the start of the first season, the Association has handed out Life Membership to 44 men who each deserved the position for their dedication to the Association.

The Association has held a presentation from 1921-22 season and has only not held a presentation for the 2019-20 season due to Covid 19. Trophies presented from the original season are still in use today;

A Grade Premiers received the H.P. Cornish shield.

B Grade Premiers received the Scott Shield

C Grade Premiers received the Pearce Cup

Trophies have been donated throughout the years to the Association which has presented them to teams who either were Premiers or Major Premiers and those who won both. Some of the trophies are named after past and present Life Members, which are still being used. They are showing their age, but with tender care and maintenance they may last for more years to come.

Mr. Arthur Soper OAM sourced Sponsorship with Kookaburra Sports Pty Ltd, this has been for around 20 years, the Association uses Kookaburra cricket balls. The sponsorship includes Kookaburra cricket

gear for those who were outstanding in their grade and received the award at the Presentation. Also, included is Kookaburra, supply a guest speaker to help with presenting the Kookaburra Awards, and talk about their story of participating in cricket.

The Association has had some famous quest speakers from W. A. Oldfield, Keith Miller, Lindsay Hassett, Arthur Morris, Alan Davidson, Sir Donald Bradman, Ray Lindwall, Garry Gilmour, Rick McCoster, Max Walker, Doug Walters, Merv Hughes, Keith Stackpole, Greg Chapple, Dean Jones (Passed away 2021), Ian Healy, Mark Waugh and Arthur Morris, who started his cricketing career with the Blackalls club. Arthur then a school boy, played matches with his father who was a teacher at Toronto, till they moved to another area due to his posting by the education department.

In the 1979/80 season the Association broke new ground with the acceptance of an all-ladies team to compete in the E3 Grade Saturday afternoon competition, after several weeks the girls won a game and deserved the win too. Now a lot of men must have felt threatened or something because the games have certainly hotted up, both physically and verbally. Under such extensive pressure, quite a few girls gave the game away. Fortunately, there were a couple of teams who, still gave the girls a fair go. The girls were very grateful to them, Albion, South Wallsend and also Hexham.

With Women`s cricket finally being recognized throughout the cricketing world; Australian cricket had a major influx of participants from young girls too young ladies. These players became the leading stars while being shown live on air, they helped in opening the eyes of the male dominate sport that women are quite capable of playing the sport of cricket and other sports played in Australia.

With help from Life Member Noel Moig and Kookaburra, a first for the Association, an invitation to Alyssa Healy was made. Alyssa accepted and became our first female quest speaker, and hope will not be the last. Alyssa entertained the crowd with about her life in cricket, her appearance saw cricketers bring their partners to hear and meet Alyssa.

Over the history of the Association, has seen player`s leave home to play cricket, but not return home after passing away while playing. In a match between E.L.M.A. Vs Hamilton Eureka at Myer Park on the 10<sup>th</sup> November 1945, Campbell Rudgley while batting for E.L.M.A received a rising delivery that hit him behind the right ear. He collapsed, and a Newcastle Ambulance was called, and transported to hospital where he never regained conscious.

### **Representative Cricket**

#### **“Daily Telegraph Shield” 1949/50 Season**

The Association had the distinction of being the first, outside of the Metropolitan area to win the “Daily Telegraph Shield.” Newcastle City and Suburban was the 12<sup>th</sup> of 25 Associations, which have contested it, to win the trophy which has been contested for 25 seasons.

Two colourful incidents contributed to the success:

D Wendt, M Jones (Police Boys Club) and N Gilbert (Hume Pipe Works) scored 126 runs in 40 minutes to obtain an outright win against Manly-Warringah at North Sydney Oval.

J Jamieson (Cardiff), bowled the most sensational over of the series against C.Y.M Association at No 1 Sports Ground, January 2 1950. He took 3 wickets for none in the opening over. C.Y.M eventually closed with 15 runs on the board. Newcastle went on to win outright.

#### **Australian U/21 Carnival**

The Association had the honour of having 4 players selected in the NSW team for the 1970/71 season. These players are John Sazdanoff, Darrel Porter, Rowan Burgess and John Maguire who all acquitted themselves extremely well. John Sazdanoff was the outstanding batsman heading the aggregates and averages, he also scored a century against Victoria

1971/72

The Australian Cricket Union this year honoured our Association by allocating the U/21 Interstate Carnival to Newcastle to commemorate our Jubilee year. This is the first time the Carnival has been played outside of a Capital City.

The organisation of the Carnival was carried out by a sub-committee comprising of Messrs A Cook, K Mathieson and F Herne and the fact the entire arrangements went through without a hitch and the compliments of all the Interstate officials speaks volume for the excellent job carried out by the committee.

1973/74

The Carnival was held in Melbourne, and the Association was honoured by having 7 players selected in the NSW team. These players were John Sazdanoff (Captain), John Maquire, Warren King, David Campbell, David Thaw and Peter Golledge, who all performed very well and vindicated their selection.

The NSW team went through undefeated and brought the shield back to NSW. At the end of the Carnival, selectors named an Australian X1, and three of the Newcastle members were selected, John Sazdanoff, David Campbell and John Maquire. A further honour was bestowed upon John Saadanoff when he was named Captain of the Australian team.

**Arthur Soper**



There is a saying “if you want something done ask a busy person to do it,” couldn’t apply more to Arthur. Throughout his life Arthur found time to help others, from being a member of the Salvation Army and working his way up the ranks of the Association.

In an official capacity Arthur served as Secretary of the Youth Revival Crusade for 40 years while he started his time on the Board of the Association as a general committee member in 1971, he remained a committee member for 4 years.

At the 1975 AGM he became a Vice President on the Board, remaining in that position for 6 years. Come the 1981 AGM Arthur moved into the position of President and remained there for 31 years (longest of all Presidents), he stood down as President at the AGM of 2012. He would rise at 5am each morning before work and well into his retirement, he would be tending to cricket wickets at 7 ovals- watering, mowing, and rolling them so they would be ready for competition. All his 10 grandchildren have helped him at some time another.

"I loved being the President; I had a lot to do," Arthur said to the paper.

"I do think I did a good job and that's not boasting – the results show that." At one point during Arthur's tenure as President the cricket Association was the biggest in the southern hemisphere with more than 4,000 players.

The Association owes Arthur, something which the Association can never achieve. Arthur expected nothing in return, however his efforts had not gone unnoticed and in 2014 he was awarded the Order of Australia for his services to cricket and the community.

### **NCSCA Tour of New Zealand**

The Association made a decision to launch its most ambitious venture in the 70 years of its existence. The Association decided in taking a senior team to New Zealand South Island for a nine-match tour in 1992.

A party of 19, including 14 players left in January 1992 and returned on February 1. It will be the first time a representative team from the Association has played outside NSW. The venture was the idea of C and S committeeman and former long-serving A grade player Ted Atchison, who managed the touring party. Atchison has made overseas tours with the Newcastle Cavaliers, a privately organised group, and suggested the C & S body try something similar

Grant Turner, who heads up the playing contingent, has been active in the fund-raising side of the tour preparations. C & S secretary Col Foster said the association has entertained several New Zealand teams in Newcastle and it was hoped the tour would encourage further reciprocal visits. "It's certainly a landmark for our association to take on an overseas tour," Col said. "But we hope it will play a part in spreading interest in the game."

"We are unaware of the strength of teams in several of the centres on the itinerary but it's clear that some of the matches will be a good test for our players."

The players were Grant Turner, Darren Morley, Steve Newman (Sunnyside Tavern), Zelco Spoljaric, Dean Hodges, David Appleby (Phoenix), Stuart Bartsch, John Youngberry, Paul Oswald (Shortland Electricity), Noel Jeffery, Dean Pannowitz (Elliott's-Lambton), David Lane (Technical College),

Alan Swan (Nelson Bay), and Peter Hilcox (Marquis O'Lorne Hotel). Colin, and C & S president Arthur Soper, umpire Bryan Cameron and scorer Lloyd Appleby completed the party.





# First C. & S. side named

They are former top District players Col Petherbridge, Graham Young and Laurie Stokoe.

The match against Western Australia is the first interstate representative fixture played by Newcastle in the Junior Cricket Union competition.

Last season a Newcastle under 21 side played the Victorian under 21 side,

Young and Stokoe are playing their first season in the City and Suburban competitions.

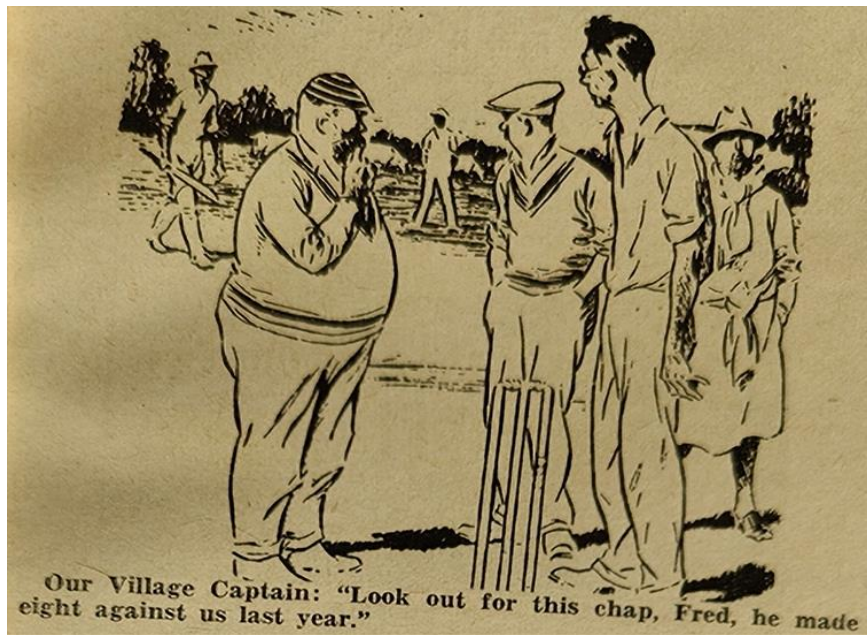
Mooce is a former opening batsman with Lambton-New Lambton and Stewarts and Lloyds, and should open the innings with Peter Rymer.

Soper, who was re-elected for his eighth term as president at the same meeting, has been a dedicated worker for the C and S organisation at both administrative and 'grass roots' levels.

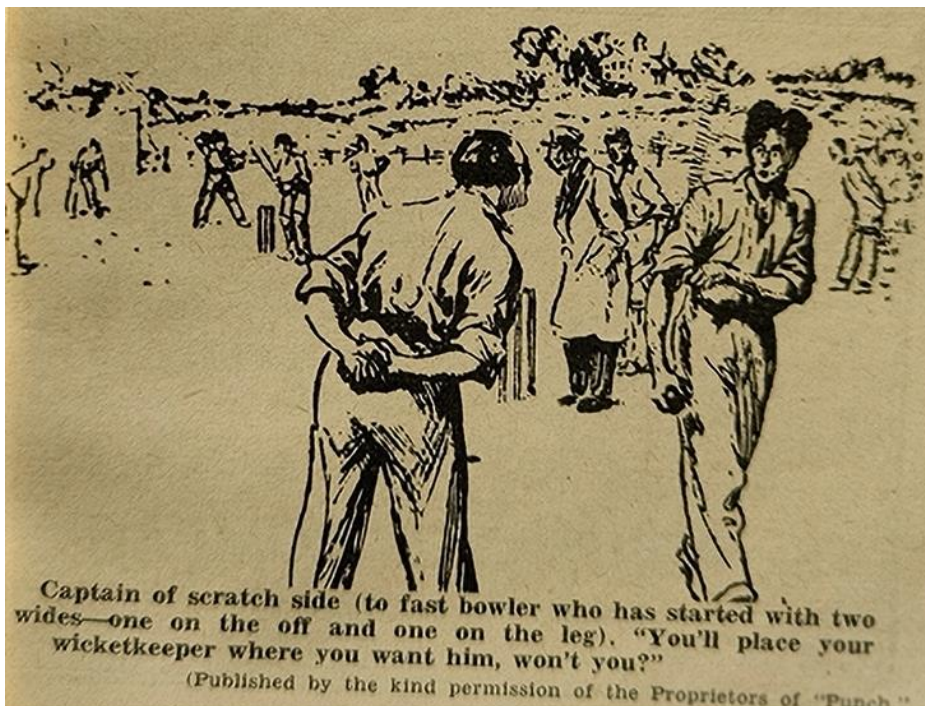

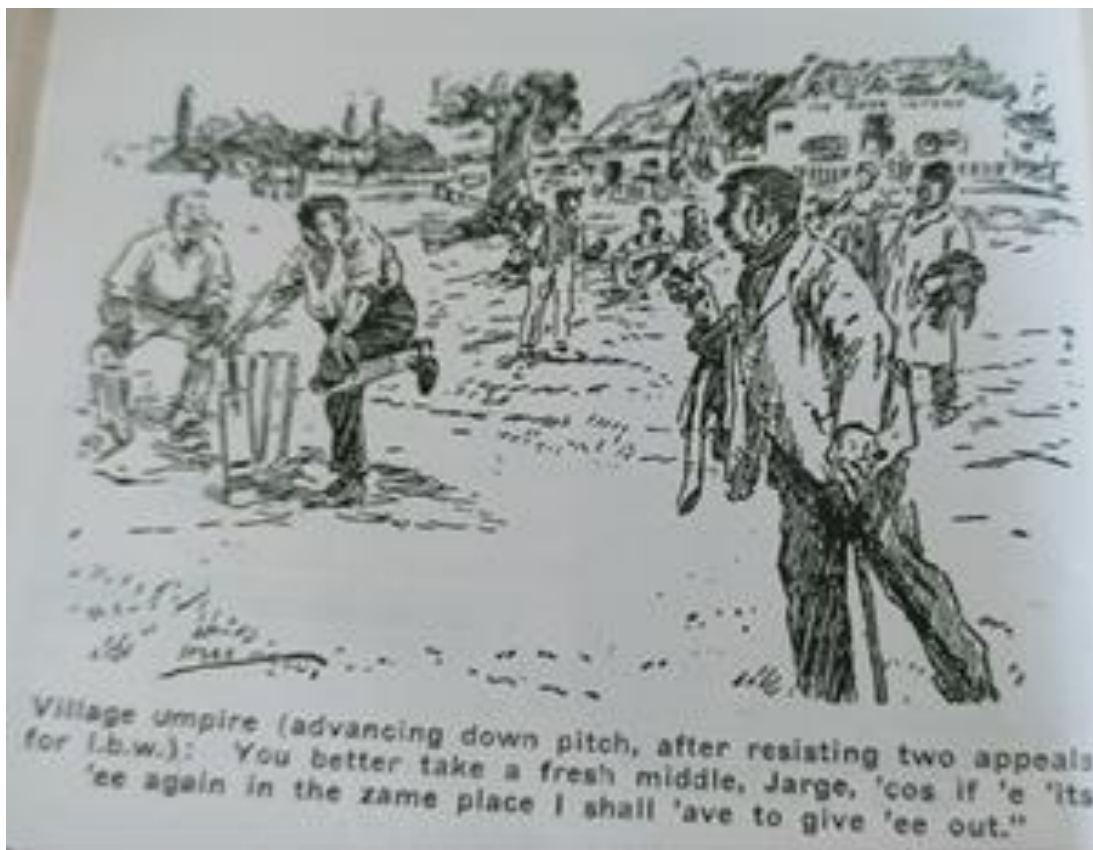

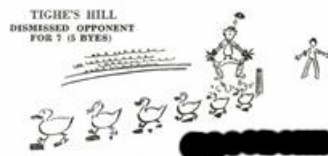


## Articles from the Associations Annual Books

1948/49, 1949/50, 1950/51, 1952/53, 1960/61

### 1948/49 Season

#### Tighes` Hill Dismissed Opponent for Seven (5 Byes)



Tighes` Hill Club in the 1932-33 season dismissed Sandgate for 7 runs, 5 of which were Byes. 2 batsmen scored 1 run each, and the Sandgate team was dismissed for 4 in a D Grade match the season before.

#### Stockton Peninsula

Stockton Peninsula Club built Dalby Oval at a cost of f1500. Half the ground has been lost by foreshore erosion. The area of sand dunes was granted to the club in 1932/33 by Stockton Council on condition that least f200 was spent on improvement. The club removed the undergrowth, had the dunes leveled, and obtained thousands of tons of filling which was spread. A turf wicket was laid, fences and shelter shed erected. The ground was ready for play in 1933/34, cost of materials alone approximated at f1000. The project was financed by loans from the City and Suburban Association.

## Redhead



Jack Stroke, playing for Redhead B grade it first season, had the annoying experience of seeing his hat go for 4 instead of the ball. He connected properly with the ball he received, but to his amazement the blade went flying towards the boundary, the ball stayed at his feet. It occurred to him he used a bat with a broken handle. He was at a loss to why the umpire refused to recognize the 4 and the laughter coming from the opposition.

## Lost Match and Lost a Hat



Port Waratah Club, which has held the “Sun” Shield Railway Trophy for a season, blamed a large hat for losing one of its matches. At Fraser Park one of the outfielders wore an oversize hat. When he chased the ball, the hat flew off, he stopped, retrieved the hat, then retrieved the ball.

The match eventually lost by 30 – 40 runs. The club’s mathematician calculated that the difference had been brought about by the hat. After the Hawksbury river was crossed on the return journey one (good) hat had disappeared.

## Awaba Club Provides Taxis

Awaba Club has provided taxi transport from Toronto to its ground, a distance of 5 miles, to ensure the attendance of visiting teams. Due to the lack of suitable transport, the taxis where the only transport.

## Y.M.C.A

One of the Association`s original clubs, the Y.M.C.A. has played consistently in the competitions but with little success. It has won final in 22 years – D Grade (1946/47), the club was founded by the Association president, Mr. N Wynn-Opie, who was then secretary of the organization in Newcastle.

Mr. A Terry was a prominent wicket-keeper with the club with which he continued until five years ago. J. Hayes and the McDonald brothers were the most prominent players in the past few years.

## Toronto Experimental Wicket Failed

Toronto, which commenced last season, laid one of crickets most unusual wickets – Maltoid on gravel. If any club is considering such a type, it is suggested that it contacts Toronto. The wicket which cost f15 to lay proved a total loss, the malthoid tore in many places and assumed an appearance of an undulating plain.

Shortage of concrete compelled Toronto to undertake the experiment for the start of the season. Gallons of adhesive solution were poured over the gravel then the malthoid laid, but to no effect. A concrete wicket was laid quickly to replace the experimental effort.

A turf was simultaneously put in hand by the urban area committee, this wicket will be in play during the current season. The “do it now” policy of this club has made it a valuable acquisition to the Association.

### **Central Islington**

#### **Built and lost an Oval**

Plume Oval was the club`s monument to its hard work and initiative. The club`s work is an inspiration to all cricketers. This land, which had been reclaimed with sand pumped from the harbour, was filled with hundreds of tons of material given by Alderman G. Jenner, when he was Lord Mayor of Hamilton.

Messrs. A Chambers and G Curry, club pioneers, gave the use of their lorries gratis to cart the material. Under the supervision of Mr. R. Ford, the wicket became one of the whole district`s best. Value of the work done on the ground was in excess of f1600.

Vacuum Oil Company`s expansion plans, has taken the ground and other land around the oil tanks.

### **Stockton Rovers**

#### **Club has six state hockey players**



Stockton Rovers is a team of hockey players who keep their eyes in during the summer months by playing cricket. Six have gained state honours in hockey. R Clarke, W Murray, G Dyball and W Twaddell played for New South Wales. R Taylor, club secretary, and D Gill represented in the State Junior team. Mr. A Taylor, original Club President, is a state hockey umpire.

A Linich, hero of last summer`s surf tragedy at Stockton, H Rowlett, treasurer of the Stockton surf club, and D Sheriff, distance runner, are other personalities of the area.

### **West Wallsend**

#### **Secretary is Association Veteran**

Roy Williamson, Secretary of West Wallsend, is a City and Suburban representative player of the past. He was for many years associated with the Hamilton Methodists Club, with which he was a prominent batsman. West Wallsend always had trouble in getting teams to travel to the township. Usually, the number of forfeits that confronted the Association was a deterrent to the club`s entry.

This position has been eliminated by the construction of one of the districts best turf wickets. Coal Board plans provide for the construction for a model playing area at West Wallsend Park, so a visit to the township will be one of the attractions of the Associations competition.

The club had its best season in the Association when it reached the final against the strong Police Boys Club team last season. Wet weather limited the match and cast a psychological influence over the toss.

Westy has lost one of its stalwarts in Constable George Godfrey, who was a personality and fine leader, he has gone to Swansea. D. B. Roe headed the Associations A Grade aggregates with 500 runs.

### South Swansea Wicket Mystery



South Swansea Club nearly required the C.I.B or F.B.I to solve the mystery of the torn mats for last season. Following the match between Gateshead and the Newcastle Co-operative Store, the mats were left lying on the wicket. Next morning tears were evident in the mat and the approaches to the wicket were damaged. Obvious solution seemed to be that the teams using the ground had offended by wearing spikes or sprigs.

Both teams supported by the umpire asserted that neither spikes or sprigs had been worn. Then they discovered the real solution. Horses had been seen on the ground on the Saturday night. Similar experiences were in evidence at Minmi and New Lambton, horses tore rips in the malthoid, some over a foot long.

### **One leg man can play**

Athol Conners, Lambtom – New Lambtons One-legged cricketer, set a major problem for the cricket rule experts during the season. Is a man without a leg, who must use a crutch to field, entitled to use it to stop the Ball.



Athol fell foul of an umpire for the first time, at Awaba he stopped the ball with his crutch. The umpire awarded 4 runs, taking the viewpoint that the crutch was an obstacle. The cotention of some players is that a crutch, to a one-legged man, is his second leg and that he is entitled to use it as a normal person would use his foot to stop the ball

### **Hits in Harbor**

Newcastle Cricket Club played its early matches on the A.A. Co. paddock which adjoined the offices of the company in Wharf Road. To hit the ball into the harbour was the goal of all prospective big hitters.

### **Five-Wickets in Seven Balls**

Five wickets in seven balls morally won the Southern Division of the D Grade competition for Newcastle Starr Bowkett Club. Bowling against Hamilton, Gordan Koina, the club's principal bowler, who secured 45 wickets for 265, took 5 wickets in Seven balls to win the match outright.



## **Monkley`s 10 Wickets**

Ross Monkley, Rylands C.C, was the first City and Suburban bowler to take the whole 10 wickets in an innings for two seasons. Monkley secured 10 for 30 off 16.2 overs, five maidens in the semi-final of the A Reserve Grade, East/West Division, against Junction.

## **1950/51**

### **Pipe Smoke Screen Lost Final**

Pipe smoke and ashes that entered a fieldsman`s eye preventing him taking the vital catch in a final is regarded by A. "Pat" Bethune, veteran Blackalls slow bowler, as the most humorous incident of the 34 years of his career.

In the B Grade final between South Mayfield and Breckenridge`s (1925/26), South Mayfield battered first for 72. Breckenridge lost four wickets for 11, then came Arnold Morris, most prolific run-getter of the day. He established the record aggregate of 1098 two seasons earlier. It stood till 1936/37.

George Price, Association secretary, was dispatched to the square leg boundary. Morris pulled the first ball straight to George, who had just finished filling his pipe. He looked up. The pipe flung tobacco, ash and smoke into his eye. George grovelled vainly to free his eye and grasp the vital catch. But the ball fell safely to earth, George`s pipe followed it. He fumbled desperately with pipe and ball on the grass. Morris scored 146, his partner, Geordie Wonders 76. That catch cost South Mayfield the final.

### **Cooper Combination`s Coup**

George and Jim Cooper, Maitland Road Baptists, provided the season`s example of brotherly co-operation against Waratah-Mayfield. George took all 10 wickets; Jim, wicket-keeper, dismissed five for him.

### **Umpire Barred a Bat**

Jack Murphy, secretary of Waratah Golf Club, Cockle Creek, was a member of the Stockton Peninsula cricket club. Jack was a noted humourist, who struggled to score runs.

On one occasion Jack considered that the bats he was using were the cause of his trouble, so he evolved the idea by widening a bat would help him overcome the attack readily. The day he chose for the try-out was when an elderly gentleman was appointed. Stockton`s innings passed along placidly, until Jack disturbed it.

He walked out with his super-width bat and called for centre; the umpire gave it. He then jumped, gasped and stared at the ponderous timber that almost obliterated the stumps and wicket-keeper. You can`t use that bat, he grunted. The rule says no bat can be more than a 4 and a quarter inch`s. That`s wider than that, get another bat. "Are you sure of the sizes?", inquired Jack, I thought this one was right. "It`s not" barked the umpire, Jack retired to the pavilion to obtain another bat.

### **Johnson`s X1**

Bill Johnson almost caused his teammates to believe in the supernatural when playing at Dalby Oval. He was fielding on the boundary when a ball was swept high to the leg in his direction. Running vigorously, Bill was making strenuous efforts to reach the ball, when he suddenly he disappeared.

The team stared; it was unbelievable. Then slowly Bill's head appeared above the low precipitous edge of the eroded beach which borders the oval. Bill had mistaken the edge in his enthusiasm and falling to the beach below, fortunately uninjured and no ball.

### **Cardiff's Non-Stop Bowlers**

A "Sandy" Alder and J Jamieson, Cardiff A Grade opening attack was a non-stop bowling combination. Match after match the two opened and carried on uncharged. Alder took 65 wickets for 710 from 189 overs, 15 maidens; Jamieson 51 for 567, from 145 overs, 20 maidens.

### **Kemp Shook Schole's Record**

Ron Kemp, Marcus Clark's medium pace bowler, made Jack Schole's record of 137 wickets in a season quake when he obtained 130 in all matches. Scholes has held the record for the greatest number of wickets in an Association season since 1942/43, when he established it with Hume Pipe Works Second Division.

Kem secured 117 in the competition and 13 in semi-final and grand final. His best figures was against Whitebridge when he took 12 for 35, next best 7 for 17.

### **Bert Haslam's Cake**

Bert Haslam, Cambridge-West End club supporter, was the donor of one of crickets unique trophies. It was an immense cake miniature of a cricket field complete with players.

Bert a baker and cricketer in younger days, still enjoys the company of cricketers. For three years he has been an ardent worker for the Cambridge-West End. Each year he has presented a cake which excelled previous one. This years eclipsed all.

Bert had all ground details in his artistic decorations. On a field of emerald green stood the attractive little picket fence in icing. On the white "concrete" slab in the center the teams battled out the game. Batsman were fully equipped while bowler, fieldsmen, umpires, stumps, creases, ball and all essentials were evident.

### **Hamilton Central's Thirst Quenchers**

Inadequacy of amenities that exist on playing areas of Newcastle has been overcome by the initiative of Hamilton Central Club. Since its members are well provided with lorries one has been requisitioned to carry ice and generous supply of soft drinks to the ground each Saturday.

### **Hall 50 Wickets for "The Store"**

R. Hall, Newcastle Store D Grade bowler, was the first club member to secure 50 wickets in a season since the club reformed after World War 2. Hall took 50 for 470 and scoring 174 and held 12 catches

# 1952/53

## Newcastle Cricket Ground

When you walk along Corlette Crescent at Cooks Hill, Newcastle you are treading upon hallowed ground – at least that is if you are a cricketer enthusiast! For you are walking on a portion of what was once the famous Newcastle Cricket Ground.

In bygone days, all the principal cricket, football, athletic and other sporting events used the ground. Upon the excellent cricket pitch that was here, there appeared most of the prominent cricketers of those early days – many world famous names come to mind, Murdoch, Grace, Spofforth, Giffen, Bonner, Blackham, Bannerman, Ranjitshinji, Noble, Trumper, and son on-in fact, all the noted Australian players and touring International teams of their day, have played on this ground.

### Ryan`s Centry in 25 minutes

A Ryan, Hamilton North`s allrounder, made a hetic centry against Excelsior in 25 minutes. He and L Kennedy added 124 unfinished for the third wicket. This was the first centry partnership, and second centry by a club member

### Ron Lawn – 103 slip catches

Ron Lawn “Daily Telegraph” shield captain and Police Boys club opening batsmen – slip fielder, has established a record performance for the Association, by taking 103 slip catches. Lawn is the outstanding junior produced by the Association. At 24 Lawn has 10 years experience behind him, including representative honours in 2 state junior teams,

Lawn, who has now taken 114 catches altogether, “froze” on 99 slip catches for several matches. He waited in vain for the dramatic 100 catch. It was not one of those spectacular thrusts or dives which shot swift, as an arrow from a fast bowler`s out-swing, nor one that required split second anticipation off a slow bowler. It was a misshit skied high to second slip, rons reaction, “what a bloomin one it was, too for the 100<sup>th</sup>.”

In competition play with the Police boys club he has scored 3,401 runs and has taken 394 wickets.

### Mitchell Park

The players carried water from wells to water it before rolling it ready for play. Matting was used over the ashes, other grounds in common use were at Wharf Road near the A.A Co office`s Tighes Hill, on the road to the present Steel-works, and the old Lambton ground, which was on the Southern side of Lambton Road opposite the present hotel.

### Lambton Farce

Bill Ttiaylor, 81 year old opening batsman for the Burwood Colliery Club recalls a bowling effort on the ground. He opened the attack with Harry Bryant, former Mayor of Hamilton . Rain interrupted after Burwood had headed Lambton, so the players adjourned to the hotel for refreshments. Half an hour left for playing, when rain ceased, so Lambton elected to bat again, claiming that it would protest if the game were not continued. Burwood took he field in mufti, although he had never bowled in matches,

Bill opened the attack. He took Four for none in his first over, Bryant took Two next over and Bill One with the first ball of the third, then Lambton found form and hit sixes and boundaries from the rest.

### **Teralba Rescue**

L Locke, Toronto fieldsmen was blissfully unaware of the necessary qualification when he was assigned outfield patrol (via Cockle Creek bank) when playing at Tulkala Park. Locke pursued a lusty smite to the bank. A willing youngster who was busily engaged fishing at the spot the ball went into the water, allowed enthusiasm to outway the knowledge that he was unable to swim. Result – one lad and one ball in difficulties.

Locke performed the double rescue, he pulled both out of the “drink”. His attire was very wet, but returned to the outfield patrol. He was soon relieved of his uncomfortable post, so that he could “dry himself out.” Having accomplish this {method of drying not on record}, he returned.

The following year, he entered it in the City and Suburban competition, where it was graded "C" to be promoted to A reserve for the next season. Since then, the Police Boys' team bettered, and for the past decade has been one of the most dominant A grade teams the Association has ever had.

#### Manager

As a manager and coach of the early teams, "Mac" was excellent. In his time he has moulded many talented youngsters who are now dominant names in both club and district cricket.

Even now, with limited time, Mac still maintains a high interest in C. and S. cricket, following what may be described as the team of his creation in its weekly fixtures.

But his efforts for cricket have, by no means, been limited to one club. As a member of the executive for many years he has contributed greatly to the administrative angle.

He has also managed Telegraph Shield teams for the Association, from the first entry by this Association till 1949-50.



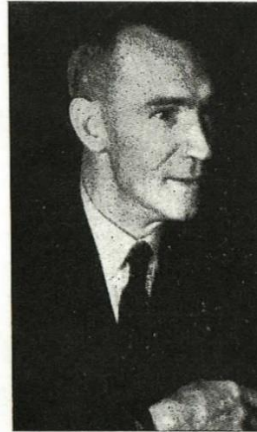




**D. H. BLACKLEY, Vice-President, Life Member (12½ yrs.)**

Dan Blackley, one of the Association's younger veterans, has acted as Chairman of the Executive Committee in Mr. Opie's absence. His directness of manner and desire to get on with the job on hand have given a valuable impetus to Association activities. His experience as an accountant, coupled with his interest in cricket administration, has proved of immense value to the Association in augmenting various organisational schemes.

Service to the Association includes the offices of Assistant Secretary and Treasurer, Chairman of several committees. Captained the old South Mayfield team, with which he played for many years.



**G. R. BEATH, Patron, 1948-49 (20 years).**

George Beath, Patron of City and Suburban this season, and vice-president for the past 19 years, is another of the pioneers who have been responsible for the exalted position that the Association holds in Newcastle today. Mr. Beath is one of the city's leading commercial life personalities. He is managing director of Davies and Cannington Pty. Ltd., one of the largest printing houses in the State, a director of a number of other companies and a member of the Newcastle Chamber of Commerce, as well as other business organisations.

George Beath has rendered splendid service to the Association in which he played for many years with various clubs. He is one of the personalities responsible for the prestige of cricket in the community.

**H. G. ELLIOTT, Patron, 1947-48 (22 years).**

Mr. H. G. Elliott, Patron of the Newcastle City and Suburban and President of the Newcastle Bowling Association, is one of the finest sporting figures to grace either sport in this city. For 19 years he was a vice-president of this Association, two Patron and one an Executive Committeeman. Meanwhile he was President of the Broadmeadow Cricket Club, of which he was captain for a considerable time.

While with Broadmeadow, Mr. Elliott encouraged juniors with the result that such players as Camps, Turners, Jones brothers and others made their mark in N.D.C.A. competitions.



**GEORGE PRICE, Vice-President, Life Member (25 years).**

George Price, former secretary, now a vice-president and Life Member, is one of the personalities who typifies the Association in its earliest times. George took over from Mr. Opie as secretary when the finances were in a precarious state. For the next 18 years he sought to stabilise the Association's finances, occupying the joint positions of secretary and treasurer. Those years presented difficulties that are entirely foreign to those in the administrative sphere to-day.

George retired when the present set-up was inaugurated in 1942-43. His work as Customs Officer compelled him to relinquish his cricket interests.



## President Bill Marsden

The President, William Marsden has been playing and administering City and Suburban cricket since 1936.

He began his career with B. H. P. Electric's team in B Grade in 1936, and with that team worked through to A Grade in 1939, then its captain.

After two years in A Grade, the club folded and Bill transferred to Mayfield Methodist,

which also played A Grade while he was with them.

His playing career finished in the 1950-51 season.

In 1939, Bill was elected to the committee of the Association, and he has held a position there ever since. For four years he was registrar, and for seven years Vice-President. This is his third term as President.

An all rounder of no mean ability, Bill represented the Association in inter-district matches but was of greater value organising them, and later managing the Association teams.


**H. MITCHISON, Vice-President, Life Member (37 years).**

Having served an apprenticeship of some five years with the Umpires' Association, Mr. Mitchison has brought to the Executive Committee in his 12 years as Vice-President the benefit of his experience in the field of play. Like other officials, Mr. Mitchison is a leading figure in the commercial life of the city, being secretary of the Chamber of Fruit and Vegetable Merchants. He, too, brings that spirit of directness that enables prompt action to replace routine red tape.



### Long Service of Dan Blackley

Mr. D. H. ("Dan") Blackley, a former President of the Association and still a very active member of its executive first took one of the executive positions in the 1926-27 season.



the Association's administration extends over 34 of the past 34 years. He was a vice-president for nine years, assistant secretary for three and a half years, treasurer for two years, and before his election as President in 1961, had served for a year on the executive.

Absence from the district for ten years prevented him from continuous service.

His election as President was a fitting tribute, not only to Dan but to the late N. Wynne Oles who gave inspiring influence to many young men, including Mr. Blackley in the early years of the Association.

He was the fourth in the Association's line of Presidents.

His early contact with City and Suburban cricket was as scorer for South Mayfield club in 1922. He graduated through the club to become captain in 1928-31, and captain of the City and Suburban teams to play against Upper Hunter and Maitland.

Mr. Blackley (now known to many as "the big fellow") is well known as a forthright speaker, and admired by many for this. He has been actively associated with almost every project undertaken by City and Suburban, in many cases giving a strong lead.

**Annual**

With Mr. N. T. McCaffery, a former Association Secretary, Dan produced the first of the C. and S. annuals, books which had wide circulation and enhanced the reputation of the Association in many circles inside and outside of cricket.

On that occasion, when nominated for the position of Treasurer, Dan hesitated but the rest of the story is probably one of the best known in C. and S. circles.

The then President (Mr. N. Wynne Oles) looked across the table at him and said "It is an honour to be treasurer of this Association."

Mr. Blackley accepted — there could be no refusal.

**Imbued**

No man could possibly be more imbued with the traditions and ideals of City and Suburban cricket. His active service with

## Death Of Mr. Opie, C. & S. President

Mr. Norwood Wynne Opie, founder and President of the Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association, died at Stockton on Saturday morning after a long illness. He was 71.

Mr. Opie was the last of the founders to have been actively associated with the City and Suburban Association, although Mr. W. Rodway retains club interests. Mr. Opie convened the inaugural meeting of the association, when Newcastle District Association embraced district cricket, to organise club cricket. As first secretary, he faced widespread difficulties for grounds, and he foresaw that the demand for recreation in Newcastle would outstrip ground development, as it has done. He helped develop District Park from a ti-tree swamp, creating there, with the aid of clubs and the Y.M.C.A., seven fully-fenced ovals and four unfenced areas. Working bees filled and cleared the land, erected fences on the ovals, sight-boards, shelter sheds and grandstands, and tennis courts on one area.

He organised a similar project at Dalby Park, Stockton, where a large area of foreshore land was filled, an oval built and fenced, and shelter sheds erected by voluntary work by Stockton Peninsula Club, under Mr. Opie's supervision.

Sea erosion destroyed much of this work. At District Park the Tennis Association was given a lease of the original ground which Mr. Opie had pioneered. It is now the football ground. An area was recently leased to the Postal Department. A third was acquired by the aerodrome.

The association assisted in the construction of No. 2 Sports Ground. The association and its clubs have built 95 grounds throughout Newcastle and the lakeside.

### Y.M.C.A. Secretary

Mr. Opie was always keenly interested in the advancement of youth work and served as a Y.M.C.A. secretary in Newcastle, South Australia and Geelong. He was a Y.M.C.A. camp officer in both world wars. He was Y.M.C.A. secretary when he formed the City and Suburban Association, and built the Y.M.C.A. premises in King-street.

After 3½ years as secretary he went to Geelong to found the Y.M.C.A. there. Back in Newcastle in 1928-29 he became President of the association and continued in that position, becoming a life member in the 1945-46 season.

Mr. Opie was a lay preacher. He served many public, church and charity movements in Newcastle and was an alderman of Stockton Council for a term. His most notable public activity was his leadership of the opposition to portion of District Park being alienated for use as an aerodrome.

Mr. Opie was born at Norwood, South Australia, and was educated at Prince Alfred College, Adelaide. He played Australian Rules football and cricket with Norwood, and was a prominent fencer in his State.

He will be cremated privately at Beresfield to-day. Mr. Opie is survived by his wife and four daughters, Mesdames A. H. Little, M. Cox, C. Francis and C. Cleary, all of Stockton.

## Mr. Wynne-Opie Dies; President Of C. & S. Assn.

Mr. N. Wynne-Opie, who has been president of the Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association for 21 years, died to-day after a long illness.

Mr. Wynne-Opie founded the association in the 1921-22 season and was its first secretary. He held this position for three and a half years.

At that time he was Newcastle secretary of the Y.M.C.A.

He temporarily severed his connections with the cricket association when he was transferred to South Australia.

He returned to Newcastle three and a half years later and in the 1928-29 season was elected president of the association. He held this position at the time of his death. He was made a life member in 1945-46.

Mr. Wynne-Opie took an active part in the early negotiations which ultimately resulted in the reclamation of a large area of ti-tree swamp at Broadmeadow, on which District Park was established.

He served as a Y.M.C.A. officer in both world wars.

At one time he conducted a sports store in Scott St., Newcastle.

For some years Mr. Wynne-Opie lived in retirement at Stockton, where he died.

He will be privately cremated on Monday.

## Bradman honoured C and S stalwart

DAN Blackley's contribution to Australian cricket is measured by the fact that Sir Donald Bradman honoured him on his 80th birthday.

Long-time patron of Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association, Mr Blackley died on Sunday aged 83 after a short illness.

One of his four sons, Russell, recalled yesterday how the world's best batsman sent his father a letter and autographed copy of the *Bradman Albums* three years ago.

Sir Donald was one of many distinguished cricket characters Mr Blackley attracted to Newcastle as guest speakers.

### OBITUARY

'Dad was a conservative but sincere man who gave his best to everything he did,' Russell Blackley said.

'When the C and S was formed in 1921 it had 20 clubs, 24 teams and 438 players.

'In records up to 1987 it shows that in that year there was 229 senior teams and 224 junior teams, the biggest association in the Southern Hemisphere.'

Mr Blackley, a chartered accountant and company secretary, took up his first executive position

with the association in 1926-27 as treasurer.

From 1941 to 1951 he was effectively chairman during the illness of Mr N. Wynne-Opie, served as president between 1952 and 1958 and was patron from 1979 until his death.

He was also assistant secretary and vice-president. His link to the association was broken only between 1932 and 1940.

He is survived by his wife, Margritta, and sons John, Phillip, Russell and Bruce.

A funeral service, followed by a private cremation, will be held at St Philip's Church of England, Waratah, tomorrow at 12.45pm.

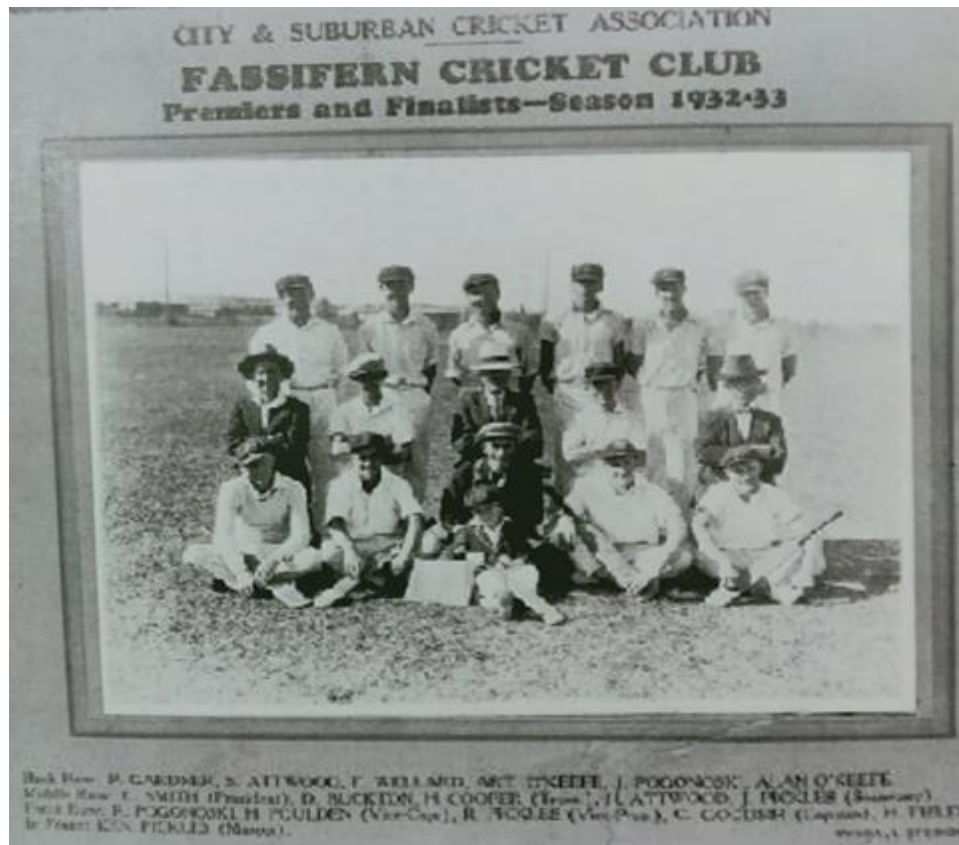

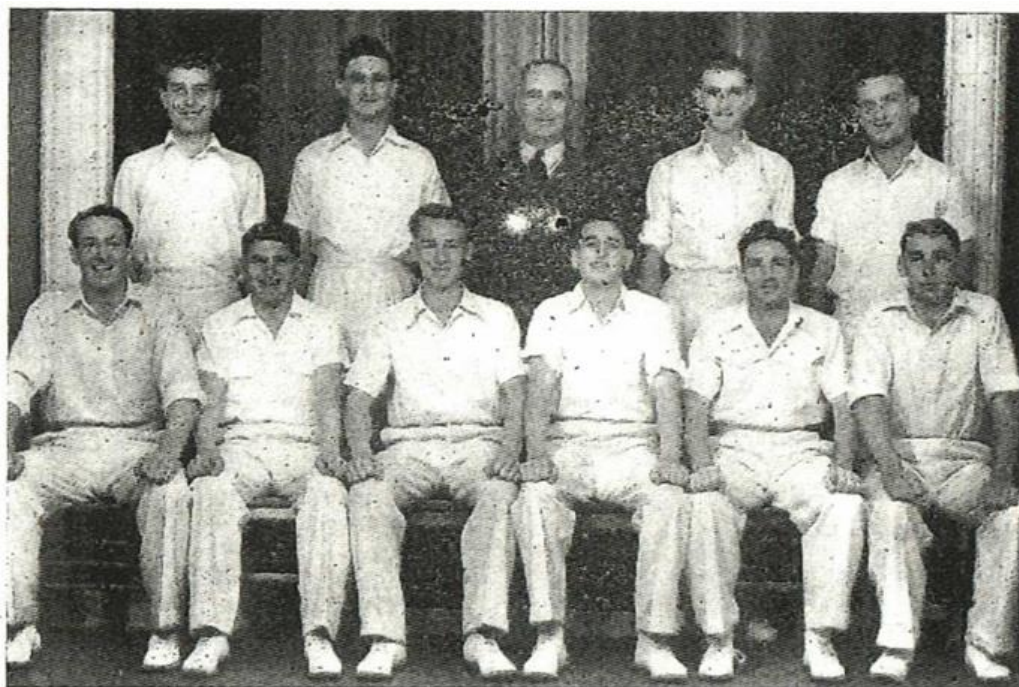

# Vince McMahon did much for cricket



**ON REFLECTION**  
with JACK MATHEWS

THERE are many in the North who, through the years, have given devoted and unstinted service to cricket — service without thought or want of reward.

A majority of these men were content to remain in the back-ground but they are the reason that cricket, lacking financial support given other sports at the turn of the century, has remained a stable undertaking for so long.

One of this great unseen band of workers for the game died recently but not to be forgotten by many who have cause to be grateful for his interest in their welfare — and not only in their cricketing ability either.

He was Mr Vincent Francis McMahon, known to associates as 'Mac' and to the admiring younger as 'Mr Mac'.

A police officer who came to Newcastle from Lightning Ridge, 'Mac' did a great deal to help cricketers, young and old, and to improve the game's image. He certainly merits a place in Newcastle's cricket history — if, and when, it is written.

In its early days the Newcastle Police Citizens Boys' Club gave hearty support to cricket, its teams being well looked after and cared for by such fine men as Arthur Williams, Dick Yardy, Herb Walton, Bill McKie and, of course, Vince McMahon.

When he came from Lightning Ridge in the early 1940s, 'Mr Mac' lived in the residence at the Newcastle West Police Station. At that time Arthur Williams was in charge of the Police Boys' Club (PBC) which had its headquarters in the Civic Wintergarden. The club had several teams playing in City and Suburban Cricket Association

lower grades. They were looked after by Dick Yardy and Herb Walton.

Among the many club members were some teenagers who played schoolboy cricket at representative team level. Most of them lived in the Islington area. Responding to their plea, Arthur Williams agreed to enter a team in a Saturday under 16 competition.

The group allowed only one 'outsider' to join the team. He was Mick Jones, of Smeilmore. He played a most important part in PBC cricket from then on.

When the lads, described in City and Suburban Association history as 'rough material needing polish' gathered at Waratah for their first competition match, they were eager to meet the team manager whom, they were told, would be appointed by the PBC management.

They were not disappointed. Across the park, carrying the team's gear bag on his sturdy shoulders came Police Constable Vince McMahon. And so started the exercise of 'polishing the rough material'.

Looking back, it was something of an important occasion, one of considerable importance for not only the club but to cricket in Newcastle in general.

Vince McMahon constructed what he described as a practice pitch at the rear of Newcastle West Police Station. It was rough but it served its purpose. Former Adamstown Rosebuds Soccer Club and NSW team player, Dave Williams, now a Northern Soccer Federation director, was one of 'Mr Mac's' lads and remembers well the pitch and the coaching.

"If the weakness was, say, the hook shot, that's what we had to

practice — and keep on practicing. He did a great job. What a grand man he was," he said.

In its first season the young team was defeated in the final. It was a different matter in its side's second season for it won the premiership. By doing so the lads proved that they were ready for open competition. But Vince McMahon was not only a sound coach and leader. He was also an astute team manager. He would not allow his young charges to be hurried into tough opposition. The team won D and B grade competition in 1943 and 1944.

Then Vince McMahon, ready for the 'big time', carried out a recruiting drive. He sought some seasoned players to mingle with his talented juniors. The club's first A reserve grade competition was won in the 1944-45 season. From a team photo its members were: Mick Jones, who was captain, Frank Williams, Rog Halsey, Rex Allen, Tom Baker, Mick Jones, Stan Drew, Ron Lown, Sid DeLoose, Wal Hancock, Doug Wardle, Jack Williams, Bill Campbell and Ossie Madigan.

The PBC team won the City and Suburban Association's A grade premiership in 1947-48 and 1949-50 with most of original A reserve grade team being involved. But 'Mr Mac' was still team building. Some new players in the side included Ted Mathieson, Jim ('Squash') Dawson, Dave Williams, Eric Baldock, Paul McGinn and Col Stephenson, later a star with Hamilton and now holding an important post with the TAB.

The club's great success was not only a tribute to the ability of the players but, most decidedly,

to the fine leadership, guidance and encouragement given by Vince McMahon, the team manager. But teams under his control had not yet reached their peak. A PBC side which won the City and Suburban Association top grade premiership in 1954-55 played a match against the Newcastle District Association's first grade premier, Hamilton, at Newcastle Sports Ground. The PBC team made 129 (Col Prouse 35) and then dismissed Hamilton for 50. Mick Jones taking six for 27, Neil Gilbert two for 15 and Ron Lown two for seven. Hamilton, in its second innings, had lost nine for 43 when play ended.

Although conditions played a part it was, nevertheless, a stunning success.

The City and Suburban Association Year Book paid tribute to the patient and dedicated approach to the game by Vince McMahon who, in eight years, brought PBC teams from under 16 grade premiership success to A grade competition's top place. The official book did not overstate the position when it claimed it to be a 'remarkable achievement'. It was even more than that.

Perhaps the fact that there are not, this season, teams from the PBC in the C and S competition is, in a perverse manner, something of a compliment to 'Mr Mac'. It would not, could not, have happened in his day.

There are not many Vince McMahons about these days. He was a man's man and a great and grand leader of youth. That so many of his lads turned out so well is proof of that.

# Former top district cricketer Barry Gibson last Monday night attended his first meeting of the City and Suburban Cricket Association.

Nothing so remarkable in that, except that Barry has been blind for 10 years.

He lost his sight in a road accident just when he looked as if he could kick on to a place in the NSW Sheffield Shield team as a spin bowler.

As a member of the Waratah Cricket Club, Barry had already played for the State Colts.

This year he was elected a member of the Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association committee, and he will certainly make a big contribution to the association's progress.

Barry, who completed a course as a computer programmer after he had lost his sight, has never lost his interest in sport.

He refuses to allow his affliction to restrict him, and "watches" cricket, football and any other sport on TV whenever the chance presents itself.

And just for the record — a bit of advice. Never argue with him about sport or sportsmen.

Barry has a mind for sporting statistics like a computer.

# C & S plan \$10,000 cricket carnival

AS many as 16 teams, including the Newcastle district and City and Suburban representative sides, are expected to be playing in a mammoth limited overs competition scheduled for Newcastle on the January anniversary holiday weekend.

The tournament, being organised by the Newcastle C and S Association, will carry a \$10,000 budget, \$1000 of which will go to the winner.

The Newcastle C and S secretary, Col Foster, said yesterday that invitations had been sent to cricket associations from Gosford to Coffs Harbour and that his association expected all of the areas to accept.

It would bring representative sides from Maitland, Gosnock, Gosford-Wyong, Singleton, Muswellbrook, Upper Hunter, Dungog, Tamworth, Taree, Kempsey, Port Macquarie, Coffs Harbour, Gunnedah and Gloucester to the district for the four-day event.

Mr Foster said the C and S body hoped to bring off the tournament as part of the Bicentennial celebrations in the district and may qualify for a grant from the local Bicentennial committee. The limited over

knockout will be played under the C and S rules, 40-overs a side or a 24 hour time limit, whichever expires first.

The organising committee is looking at playing a percentage of the matches as day-night fixtures since a number of the grounds earmarked for the tournament are floodlit.

"We decided on a round robin format so that the teams travelling from some distance won't be coming for just one game," Foster said.

"Although we haven't had any official replies the idea has been well received by all of the country associations so we're hopeful that there won't be any knockbacks."

The C and S association will defer its A grade round of matches for the weekend but Mr Foster added that the district association would not be disrupted since district cricket would be played only on the Saturday of the holiday weekend.

While he conceded that there are no sponsors for the tournament as yet, Mr Foster said it did not jeopardise the round robin. The C and S association would shoulder the financial burden if necessary.

## Long innings rewarded for Foster

WHEN he took on the job as secretary of the Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association, Col Foster's pedigree looked less than impressive. He was a young man still coming to terms with the one-day game on which the C and S competitions are based and he joined the administrative team only reluctantly. The proviso, he said, was that someone else would step in after 12 months. But he wasn't able to shed the responsibilities quite so easily. Thirteen years later Foster, now a much wiser 41-year-old, has life membership of the association — awarded at the annual meeting on Monday night — as well as the treasurer's duties to remind him that administrative teams are no dif-

ferent to any others. That is, it's harder to get out than in. Not that Foster bears any grudges for the workload he's shouldered over the years or for that matter his father-in-law, president Arthur Soper, who talked him into taking on the job in the first place. "I think I may have misunderstood the offer," Foster mentioned this week. "They must have meant 12 years, not 12 months."

"But to be honest, it's been quite challenging at times and at other times quite discouraging and a job that I'd have to say I've enjoyed."

To comprehend Foster's contribution to the game, one has to realise that the C and S Association has one of the

largest registrations of players in the country. It has grown every year bar one since Foster was strapped into the driver's seat and spoke last year when 229 teams registered for the grade competitions. While he could be accused for resenting a work schedule that is starting to assume mountainous proportions, Foster prefers to joke about his penchant for punishment and marvel at the continuing popularity of the summer game.

What it has created, however, is a job that requires his attention 12 months of each year. Funny, his load lightens considerably once the season gets underway. "I've usually played my season by the time the first competition ball is bowled," Foster explained. "The busiest time is from the end of one competition to the start of another because you've got things like the semi-finals, finals and the presentation night to organise."

"Then you've got the end of season books (he has been treasurer for eight to nine years because "I like to help out wherever I can"), rule book revision, the annual general meeting, entry night and the gradings."

"Once the season gets underway you've only got the little problems, like washouts."

To be fair, Foster points out quickly, his long-term residency has helped to streamline the responsibilities. The C and S body works with a committee somewhat larger than most organisations and this, he says, enables issues to be divided amongst various sub-committees. "They're a good group of people on the C and S executive and that's probably one of the main reasons I'm still there," Foster said. "Every year I think about retiring but I love my involvement so I invariably sign on again."

But there may come a time in the near future when Foster has no option but to step down from the C and S administration and, oddly, he has Arthur Soper to thank for that as well.

Administration and a lower grade team known as YFC were only two of the things Soper introduced to Foster when he shifted from Goolburn to Newcastle with his parents in January, 1960. The other was his daughter, Ann, now the mother of Foster's three daughters, Kylie, 11, Rebecca, 9, and Natalie, 5. And while he regrets that there are "no cricketers there", he can see the day coming when his responsibilities have to be directed exclusively to the smaller family at the expense of the C and S Fraternity he's been watching over for more than a decade.

## Cricket executive hits fourth decade

WHILE long-serving Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association officials Col Froome and Ted Aitchison decided not to renominate for the 1992-93 season, their colleague Angus Cook was re-elected unopposed as assistant secretary at the association's annual general meeting.

Cook, in his 17th year in the position, has been a city and suburban official since 1951.

His decades of service with the association follow his playing days with the Waratah-Mayfield and Kotara C&S club, which he helped form.

Cook has served on various association committees in positions up to the level of vice-president.

As well as being secretary Col Foster's assistant, Cook is also involved with the fixtures, day-night competition and appeals committees.

A brighter note on the city and suburban scene is that sponsorship has made inroads into senior clubs.

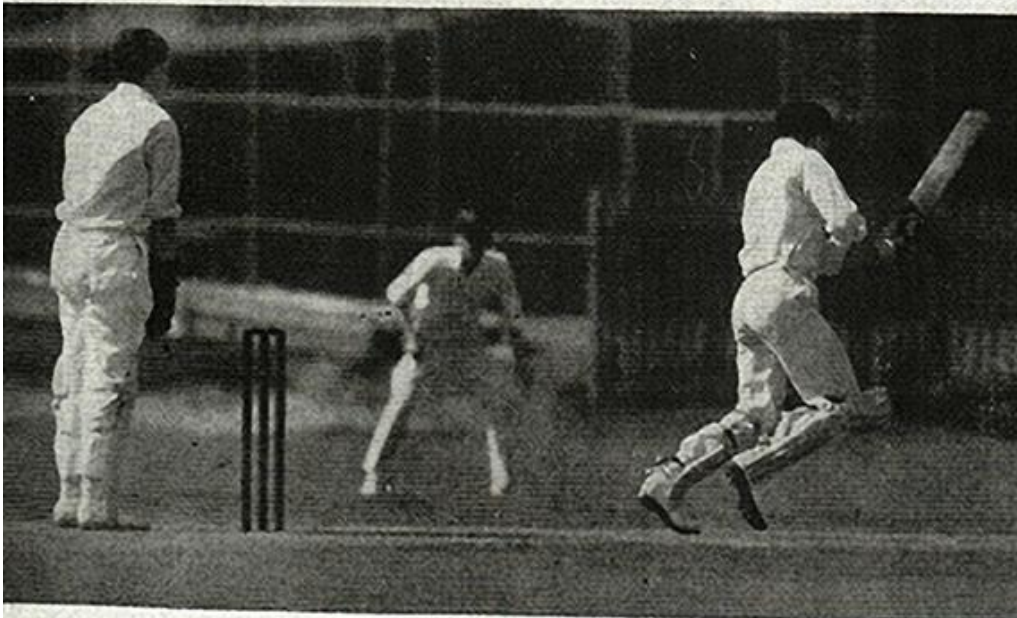

'We also thought the curator should be given credit for the preparation of the wicket, which was the best of the season and hardly had a mark on it,' Cameron said.

TWO Aboriginal teams have made a big mark in city and suburban cricket circles in Newcastle — both for themselves and their people.

It's part of a bigger drive to get Aboriginal youth, many unemployed, more actively involved in weekend sport and away from possible trouble.

And it is paying off handsomely. This year, their two teams, both seniors, reached the C & S finals on Saturday.

And although the top team didn't win, the new second team won their final with a score of 4-145.

The teams play in the B4 and the B1 sides respectively and are known as the Awabakal One and Two teams.

"We're very proud of them," said Mr Jim Wright, their batting coach and administrator of the Ab-

original Awabakal Co-op Ltd at Warkham.

"We had two sides in the finals this year but last year we had only one, in C1 division, which was its final," said Jim.

In 1984, it was the first all Aboriginal cricket team to ever win a comp in Newcastle. We think it was also the only full Aboriginal team to win a competition in NSW... there was a team at Warrington (NSW) that won something but it had only seven a side.

"And this year to get out one but both our Newcastle teams in the finals, it's great... it's fantastic."

"A lot of them we are trying to reach are in difficult socio-economic circumstances.

"We are trying to do things for them. Give them an activity. Look at the statistics of Aboriginal kids in jail."

But taking to the field can be a struggle. Costs to equip both sides plus items like umpire fees and other incidentals can be daunting.

"We're always battling for money for gear but we're used to hurdles," Jim said.

"Just to get out there; to just buy bats and pads and balls costs about \$800. And that's with a good discount on the gear."

Well, you can't have a rubbish bat. A cheapie for \$50 might only last five or six games. We get good bats to last, worth about \$80 but

they can go up to \$120.

"And wicketkeepers' shoes can cost \$30 to \$40. And none of the costs include clothes."

Jim said this same lack of funds last year forced their juniors, the under-15s, to drop out of the C & S competition circuit.

"We're hoping to tap funds from the National Aboriginal Sporting Foundation so that the same thing doesn't happen again with the juniors. Otherwise the money comes from things like raffles and donations."

"We're trying to get kids into sport for lots of reasons. It's good integration, it gets them into it keeps them out."

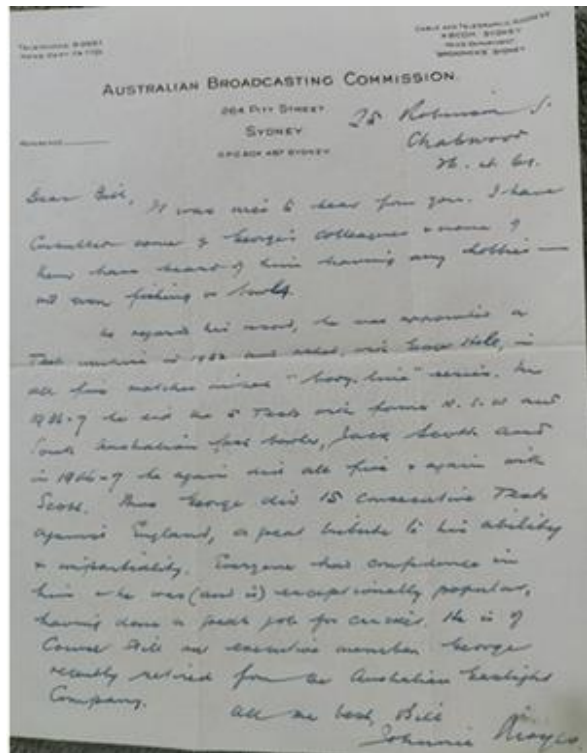

## Australia And World Cricket

The time had come when Australia, on top of the world in cricket, should give more serious thought to fostering and spreading the game outside its own country, Mr. K. S. Duleepsinhji, said in Newcastle last night.

Mr. Duleepsinhji, High Commissioner for India and former cricket international, was addressing more than 300 cricketers and officials as guest speaker at the annual presentation social of the City and Suburban Association.

"The M.C.C. has taken the lead in fostering the game through the aftermath of two world wars and I believe the time has come when Australia must share that burden more fully.

"As an 'old cricketer and friend and a lover of the game I feel it is my duty to suggest a less selfish outlook by Australia and a realisation that the game is greater than the game in one country.

"Isn't there something wrong when your neighbor, New Zealand, has never seen Don Bradman, the greatest cricket personality of our time?"

More frequent exchanges of touring teams might cause difficulties with the Australian season, but cricket here would benefit in the long run. He suggested that Australia not always send its strongest teams, but teams representing the general level, thus giving younger men a chance.

Mr. Duleepsinhji, most enthusiastically received, delighted his audience with stories of the cricketing "greats" he had known and some of his own experiences.

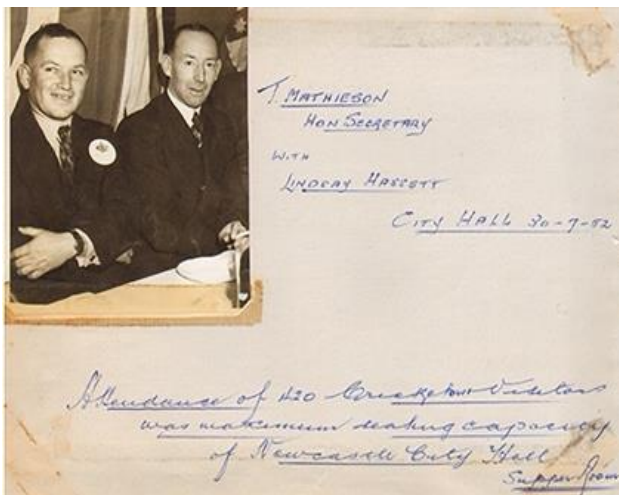

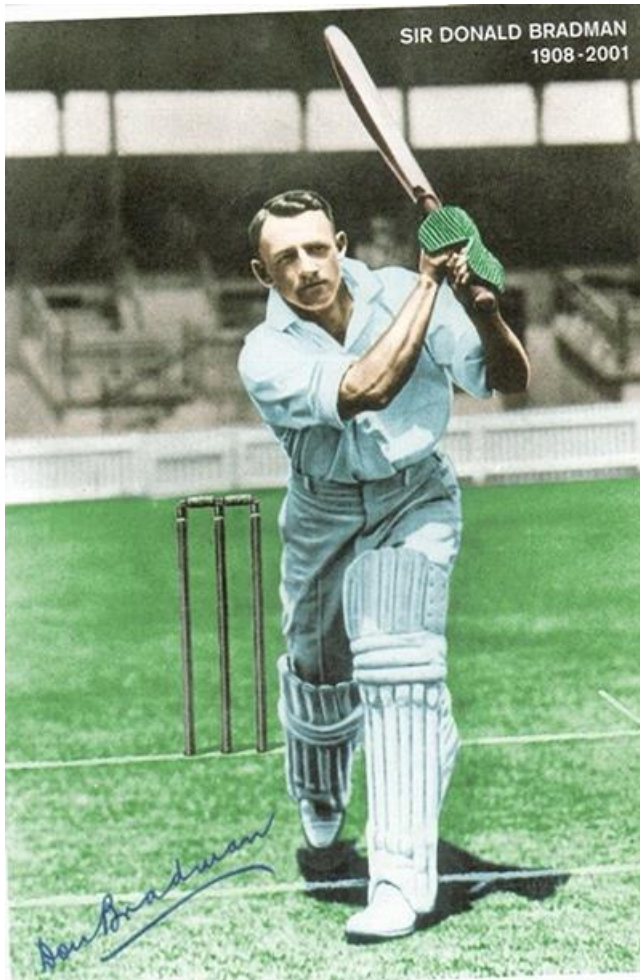

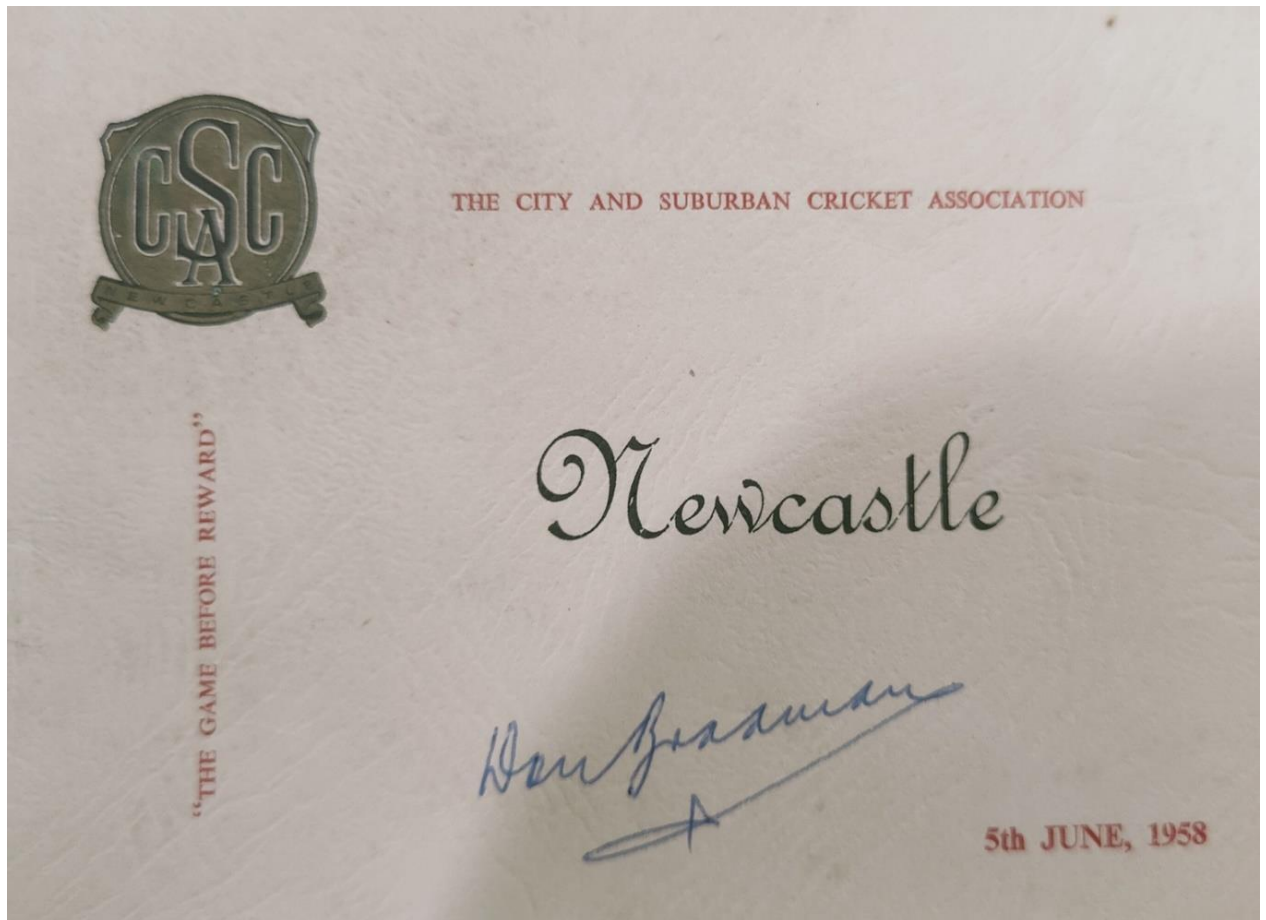

At the civic reception to Sir Donald Bradman yesterday, Mr. R. W. Brown, former Chairman of Royal Newcastle Hospital Board and for many years a cricket umpire, said he had fond recollections of Sir Donald as a cricketer and as a man. He said that once, on the first day of a two-day match in which Sir Donald was playing in Newcastle, Sir Donald—who had hit up 88—told him he was feeling hot and tired and added: "I'll have to give it away, ump." Mr. Brown said he told the cricketer: "It will mean about £100 to the Cricket Association if you do, because people won't come tomorrow if you're not batting. They expect you to knock up a century." He said Sir Donald continued to bat, went on next day, scored about 140—"and the turnstiles clicked."

Sir Donald said it was 10 years since he had finished active cricket. He felt in 1948 that he had reached the same stage as the man who said that when he was batting and the ball hit his stomach, the umpire gave him out 'leg before wicket.' When the ball "struck his tail," the umpire ruled a "wide." "When you reach these proportions, you have to give it away," said Sir Donald.

Dear Sir Donald,

I was particularly pleased to receive your letter this morning and note that you will arrive in Newcastle on the 4th June.

In addition to our normal competition of 100 teams we introduced last season a Saturday morning competition for boys under 16. This has proved highly popular and successful and the registrations in the past season totalled about 260.

Being aware that you are to attend our Annual Smoke Social hundreds of these boys have made enquiries as to whether or not they will be permitted to attend on the occasion of the Smoke but unfortunately this we cannot do.

However, it does seem a pity that these lads will miss the opportunity of meeting you and I feel, along with my colleagues, that as you will arrive on the 4th we should do something so as not to disappoint them.

As we had intended to provide the boys with a separate function I think that with your co-operation and without involving you in a lengthy attendance, we could promote the boys' function on the 4th and if you would be good enough to attend for say half an hour it would be a privilege that I know they would all greatly appreciate.

Unless I hear from you to the contrary I will proceed along these lines.

Now as regards the main function, I was personally delighted with the title suggested by you, "Cricket Yesterday, To-day and Tomorrow".

Please understand that the function will be essentially one of cricketers and I know from long experience as President that incidents, personalities and some of the more intimate details of the experiences of touring sides have a tremendous interest for our chaps.

Official visitors have been restricted, due to our desire to cater for our playing members and even in this we have had to restrict invitations to four per team, notwithstanding that in numerous cases applications have been made for as many as thirty tickets per team.

The length of time you are to speak is entirely in your hands but I know the boys will want to hear as much as possible.

Trophy presentations of necessity a big list but this we have well organized and a representative from each team files past the official table and is merely given a card indicating the trophy won and at the same time a hand shake by the person making the presentation and in this it is traditional for the Guest Speaker to do many of them but which will only take probably 15 to 20 minutes dispersed throughout the programme.

The toast list is of a minimum, the Association, and the visitors, being the only two with responses but for your part you will be called upon only for the main speech.

We will have first class entertainment and the whole spirit of the evening is for a happy night of fun, highlighted by the presence of our official Guest Speaker.

Just as a matter of interest and something upon which you might desire to comment. On the occasion of the visit of His Excellency H.E. Duleep Singh, he made reference in his address to the fact that although New Zealand is so close to Australia "they had never seen Bradman" and asked what was wrong with Australian cricket that this should be so.

He claimed that Australia was so prominent in international cricket that it had a duty to send touring sides to countries who were not so strong in an endeavour to foster the game. He said he felt that the usual series of tests were not sufficient.

I am sure you will appreciate that as you will arrive on the 4th it will be much easier to give you a better picture of the whole of the set up than it is by putting it on paper now but I hope I have given you sufficient to enable you to prepare the approach for your address bearing in mind that the bulk of the audience will be cricketers and not administrators and therefore the game itself and the great players part and present hold far more interest to them than the overall problem of cricket administration.

If there is any further information I can give you please let me know as I am as anxious as possible to assist you.

He was met at the Railway Station by the president of the City and Suburban Cricket Association (Mr. Dan Blackley).

Sir Donald will be the association's guest at a function tonight when he will present trophies.

**Sir Donald Bradman Here For Two Days**

*Sir Donald Bradman looking very fit, arrived in Newcastle this afternoon for a two-day visit during which he will attend two functions organised by the City and Suburban Cricket Association.*

Sir Donald played cricket in Newcastle in prewar days, but this will be his first visit to the city in his present-day role as one of cricket's highest administrators.

The C. and S. president, Mr. Dan Blackley, said today that Sir Donald would present the Noel McCaffery Memorial Shield to the New Lambton Public School team tonight in a special boys' function at Tyrrell Hall.

Sir Donald would also show a special film, "The History of Cricket," and two other films at the function tonight.

Tomorrow night Sir Donald will be the guest speaker at the C. and S. annual social and presentation of trophies in the City Hall Supper Room.

Mr. Blackley said that all seating at the two functions had been allotted and that more than 850 people would hear Sir Donald speak at the two gatherings.

A special programme for tomorrow night's function has been prepared. It includes a summary of Sir Donald's record during his cricket career.

Mr. Blackley said he thought so many of those hearing Sir Donald would appreciate a record of his cricketing feats that the association considered the necessary research was warranted.

The Lord Mayor (Ald. D. G. McDougall) will give Sir Donald a civic reception in the City Hall at 3 p.m. tomorrow.

**"Great Future"**

"I have been in Newcastle at least three times before," he said. "I can see enormous growth since my last visit and there is no doubt that Newcastle will have a great future."

Ald. McDougall said Sir Donald needed no introduction. He was one of Australia's most notable sons.

Speaking at a civic reception given to him by the Lord Mayor (Ald. McDougall) Sir Donald Bradman said it was unfortunate that a match against Newcastle could not be fitted into the M.C.C. teams' Australian tour itinerary next summer.

Newcastle had had several visits by the Englishmen in the past and would have more in the future, he said.

He said he believed that next summer's matches should be the best ever and that the Australian players would equip themselves well.

In all Tests Lindwell has taken 228 wickets at a fraction over 23 runs apiece, 114 in 29 Tests against England, 31 in 8 Tests against South Africa, 41 in 10 against West Indies, 36 in 10 against India, 2 in one Test against New Zealand and 4 in 3 Tests against Pakistan.

He ranks second to Berser who took 236 wickets and bowled 5000 more balls than Lindwell did.

Next best among Australians is Grimmett with 216 (only 3 bowlers have 200 Test Wickets) and then Benaud with 181.

Lindwell has made 1502 runs in Tests including a century against England (100) and one against the West Indies (118). He, Miller and Benaud are the only Australians to get 150 wickets and 1500 runs in Tests.

In all first class cricket Ray took 784 wickets and played in 224 matches and bowled more than 50,000 balls. His average was a shade under 21 runs a wicket.

He is the only fast bowler to get 100 wickets in Tests between England and Australia, his 114 costing 22.61 runs each. "

## PRACTICE 'MUST' FOR JUNIORS

Constant, objective practice was essential for success in cricket, Australian Test fast bowler Alan Davidson said in Newcastle last night.

Davidson was speaking at the presentation of trophies to Newcastle City and Suburban Cricket Association junior team winners for 1959-60 season.

Davidson said that in his early cricket days in England he had "used for the game," but was asked the problems attached to the game players in that country.

"Only playing in your own position you are going to give equal love of your own eye, but you are not going to improve your game and the only way to improve is to play in the position you are going to play in these conditions. That is, you are going to get something."

"I have spent hours in Sydney Cricket Ground and have learned for many less than an hour at a time, and sometimes you just try to get out the ball and use your own eyes. It has taught me that length and direction from the bowler's point of view, in the most practical assistance any bowler can have."

**"Not Bowler"**

"If you can't experience that feeling then you aren't a bowler," he said. "None did you will run up against an O'Neil or a Mitchell. I have not mentioned Bradman, because there's never be another like him."

Davidson added "Practice sticks to you. No matter what age you are, you can't get away from your practice, and one practice, both bowler and batsman."

### Test Umpire Names Three Top Bowlers

(By "GRANDSTAND")  
 Former Test cricket umpire, Mr. George Borthwick, told a large gathering of City and Suburban players and supporters at the City Hall last night that Ray Lindwall, Leary Constantine and Harold Larwood were easily the three greatest fast bowlers he had seen.

He said he did not want to separate the three because he only umpired Larwood when the latter was bowling short bouncers in the 1932 "bodyline" series, while Constantine appeared to be fooling light-heartedly many times while he was bowling.

Lindwall, on the other hand, had perfect control of the ball at all times. An umpire could not hear him approach the wicket to deliver the ball and he did not damage his legs, arm or shoulder in his long career.

### Press Criticism

Speaking of the bodyline Tests, Mr. Borthwick said much criticism could be laid against the Press and sporting writers of the day for the sensational way it was reported and the unkind criticism of veteran cricketers.

Bradman, the master batsman of that period, was criticised for batting outside his leg stump but Bradman's point was that the bowling and field placings were unorthodox and had to be met with unorthodox batting.

It was therefore necessary to get the ball away to the off side of the field while the on side was so tightly packed. Hence his unusual position at the wicket.

Mr. Borthwick added that after all Bradman had an average of 56 in that series, which proved the point.

Mr. Borthwick said that Allan Davidson, the present all-rounder touring England, was the equal of any fieldsmen he had ever seen.

Neil Harvey, Norman O'Neill and others as far back as Johnny Taylor and Leary Constantine were magnificent fieldsmen, but Davidson could always get to a ball and was deadly when throwing in also showing splendid judgment when returning a ball to the bowler's end.
